Dear Friends,

What an incredible year it has been. Your Museum has seen an increase in visitors and community engagement, growth in membership, and record-setting fundraisers. We finished restoring and reinterpreting permanent exhibition rooms, and added new exhibits and programs – all to better serve the community, share our distinct history, and bring more Manchester-by-the-Sea stories to life!

Together, we celebrated the bicentennial year of the Abigail Hooper Trask House, built in 1823, and culminated our fiscal year with Abigail's iconic front-entrance portico restored and once again gracing the front of our building.

We added to the Collection and enjoyed a very successful Speaker Series program. In recognition of the importance of art to this town, we continue to produce art shows, offer children's art activities, and add works by MBTS artists to the Collection.

A number of initiatives outlined in our newly minted three-year Strategic Plan were undertaken, including reconfiguring our Archives/Admin rooms and taking measures to better protect and preserve the Museum Collections and Archives.

When we met at last year's 137th annual members meeting in September, you had voted to change the name of our Museum to Manchester-by-the-Sea Museum (MBTSM). As a result, we developed a new brand identity and marketing strategy to support the new name. These efforts – including a new logo, new MBTSmuseum.org website, and signage – have helped elevate public awareness of the Museum. Increasingly, we are attracting new members, broader audiences, and visitors far beyond Cape Ann and Massachusetts.

For most of this year, we were without a director, and much of what was accomplished was thanks to the efforts of our hard-working trustees, part-time staff, and volunteers. Thank you all for your dedication, time, talent, and support.

We closed our fiscal year with the hiring of Matthew Swindell as our new associate director. We are delighted to have Matthew in this leadership role. He is a historian with work experience at several area museums. Prior to his promotion to associate director, Matthew was our Museum's archivist. His research skills were invaluable to the Curatorial team in developing our new room narratives and exhibits this past year.

Thanks to you, our Museum is highly energized and delivering on its mission. We look forward to another successful year.

Curatorial Chair Update

This past year has been transformational for MBTSM.

Informed by the Museum's motto, "History, Art, Community," and guided by the Mission Statement and Strategic Plan, the Curatorial Advisory Committee (CAC) initiated a number of improvements and changes to the Museum over the course of the year. Importantly, among them, the installation of protective UV film and custom heat-blocking shades throughout the Museum ranks high in terms of stewardship. We wish to convey our thanks to the Community Preservation Committee (CPC), whose members recognized immediately the importance of this endeavor to protect all Museum collections — including furniture, textiles, and interior finishes. Thank you MBTS citizens who voted at Town Meeting to approve the CPC-recommended matching grant.

NARRATIVE-DRIVEN EXHIBITION ROOMS

The CAC also initiated the reinstallation of all the permanent exhibition rooms on the first floor of the Hooper-Trask House in such a way that the story of Manchester's unique and fascinating history is told through its Collections. There are now labels and storyboards throughout the spaces, which tell the narratives and allow visitors to understand the personages, events, and circumstances that have shaped this town

One room has now been dedicated to the important story of the furniture-making era in Manchester. Volunteers tracked down all the Manchester-made furniture held in the Collection, and most of it is on display now. We continue to collect Manchester-made furniture and are looking forward to a gift of a sofa and two chairs from a local family. These pieces were brought directly from the

Dodge Furniture shop when it closed its doors in the mid-1960s. We are very grateful for this generosity.

In the permanent exhibition rooms, new, historically accurate paint colors (Hooper-Trask room and flooring) and energy-efficient lighting have been a very visible improvement. The repainted, built-in shelving has been installed with permanent displays of Manchester souvenir china, examples of sculpture by Manchester artists, Katharine Lane Weems and Anna Coleman Ladd, and commemorative objects of significance to the Town. Other artworks – including paintings by Manchester artist Charles Hopkinson – are displayed in the anteroom to the Exhibition Room.

The Exhibition Room currently is home to the seasonal exhibit entitled "Summers by the Sea; The Masconomo House Hotel and the Resort Era." The hope is that this space will continue to be a venue for seasonal exhibitions.

ARCHIVES

The Archives Collection at MBTSM is at the heart of the organization, and every year relevant material is accessioned. CAC spearheaded the reconfiguration of the Archival and Administrative spaces at the Museum in order to make the spaces more efficient and user friendly and to offer more space for the Archive Collection. Thanks to Joni Davis, our inspired space designer.

Digitization of the Archival Collection continues to be an ongoing and strategic effort. The team also continues to implement recommendations from archivists with the Massachusetts State Historical Records Advisory Board.

CONSERVATION

CAC also addressed some much needed conservation needs this past year with the conservation of the "Ship, Forum," a watercolor on paper by Antoine Roux, and the portrait of "Masconomo," an oil by William Henry Tappan. Both of these paintings are important objects in the MBTSM Collection and are vital in telling the story of the town. Both conservation projects were funded by a directed gift to the Bicentennial Capital Campaign.

Also, a custom plexi case was fabricated to protect the Museum's rare diorama, made in Surinam by Gerrit Carl Francois Schouten in 1837 and brought back to Manchester by Capt. Charles Fitz of Manchester.

ART COLLECTION

The Museum has been fortunate to be the recipient of some generous gifts to the Collection this past year.

Sue and Bob Thompson gave the stunning bronze self-portrait plaque by Anna Coleman Ladd (who maintained a summer studio in Manchester for some years), which depicts the artist in her WWI uniform. Anna Coleman Ladd's humanitarian act in the immediate aftermath of WWI is a particularly remarkable story. She used her artistic skills to try to help disfigured soldiers regain their identity by sculpting and fashioning prosthetic masks for the wounded veterans to wear. It is an unusually moving story, truly – the confluence of art and humanitarianism.

Christine Virden generously donated a woodblock engraving by Winslow Homer, a variant of his famous painting "Eagle Head," depicting swimmers emerging from a swim in the ocean at Singing Beach. The engraving is currently on display in the seasonal exhibition.

Last year, the Museum was able to purchase Hopkinson's "Girl in a Green Cloak" with funds raised by the Capital Campaign.

The Capital Campaign, established during 2023 to celebrate the bicentennial of the Hooper-Trask House, has reached its goal of \$200K this year. Much of what has been accomplished by the curatorial team has been done thanks to Capital Campaign and CPC funding, including the restoration of the original portico of the Hooper-Trask House.

The restoration of the portico is now complete, and certainly is the culmination of a very exciting and fruitful year.

We are grateful to all those who have helped make this past year so transformative and exciting. In particular, I am grateful to the members of this committee whose contribution in terms of time and effort has been extraordinary. Thank you.

Programs Chairs Update

Thanks to our outstanding speakers – who presented an eclectic mix of topics with storyline ties to MBTS – more than 650 people attended the Manchester-by-the-Sea Museum Spring Speaker Series. Sold-out audiences learned about mushrooms in cemeteries, grave robbing, America's first millionaires, the rise of the summer resort era, and golfing legends Margaret and Harriot Curtis.

Development Chairs Update

Thanks to your generosity, we have set a Museum record in our fundraising efforts this year. We exceeded our aspirational goal of \$200,000 for our Bicentennial Capital Campaign, were awarded seven grants, had a successful Annual Appeal, and received many gifts in kind and donations to the Collection and Archives.

To celebrate the bicentennial year of our Museum's home – the house that Abigail Hooper built in 1823 – we held a gala event at Sharksmouth overlooking the ocean. At the event, honoring Abigail and her entrepreneurial spirit and accomplishments, we announced an ambitious plan to rebuild her original portico that had been missing for almost 100 years and to raise funds for capital needs and special projects, such as restoring the portico and installing UV protection, and to support the Collection and programming.

We are elated to have exceeded the Capital Campaign's \$200,000 goal. But, more importantly, we are so pleased with the enormous community support that we have received for our Museum. We are grateful to all those who contributed and who celebrated the bicentennial year with us.

We also were fortunate to receive a diverse range of donations to the Collection and Archives. Our Associate Director Matthew Swindell likes to say: "You never know what items will be coming through the Museum's doors." Indeed, 2024 did not disappoint: gifts to the Collection and Archives that came in included an early 1900s wool bathing suit, flashcards of WWII planes to help children spot potential enemies along the MBTS coast, a Winslow Homer engraving, ship ledgers of Major Israel Forster, and an Anna Coleman Ladd bronze.

As Manchester-by-the-Sea's only museum, we have the enviable job of collecting, preserving, and sharing the fascinating stories of this vibrant and creative community. Thank you for supporting us in this mission.







The Portico



The iconic entrance portico, with classical columns, once again graces the house built in 1823 by Abigail Hooper, a successful store proprietor and banker. When planning for the bicentennial year of the house, the Museum envisioned restoring the portico to serve as both a literal and symbolic portal to welcome visitors to new experiences. A year later, the portico stands proud, enhancing the streetscape and welcoming all.

The successful reconstruction of the portico is a testament to the collaborative efforts of many. Our sincere gratitude to: all of our Bicentennial Capital Campaign donors; Luciano Andrade, whose firm built the portico; Rob MacNeille and Brian LaBau from C&M for their detailed portico drawing used in the Bicentennial Capital Campaign, and to Manchester-by-the-Sea's Community Preservation Committee, Historic District Commission, Building Department, and Zoning Board of Appeals.

A special thanks to Matt Genta, Becca Campbell, and Sue Thompson of the Museum's Curatorial Advisory Committee, whose oversight of the project – from researching historical documents and photographs of the original portico to the design phase to interviewing contractors – was invaluable. We also thank Marianne Coons of the Museum's Building and Grounds Committee, who assisted Matt – whose experience as an architect was indispensable – in managing the month-long construction phase.




